As we leave the season of Lent—the time of reflection and repentance—we come to Jerusalem, waving palms, as the Prince of Peace declares the beginning of a new kingdom with new values. It is a society that does not rely on oppression or domination but seeks community, love, justice, and flourishing for all people. As we enter Holy Week, we rejoice that the story does not end with Jesus dying on the cross. Easter morning brings about the beginning of the rest of our story as Christians — the celebration of our Jesus' resurrection!

Join us as we travel through Jerusalem to the darkest hours after the Last Supper on Maundy Thursday, from the pleading prayers in the Garden of Gethsemane and Judas' betrayal, to the hill of Calvary on Good Friday.

We are thankful that we will arrive at the empty tomb on Easter Sunday, when we can joyfully proclaim together: "He is risen! He is risen, indeed!"

Shout Hosanna for Jesus' triumphant entry into Jerusalem (Mt. 26:14-27:66). We will celebrate Communion this week!

#### April 6 - Maundy Thursday, 7 PM

The service begins at 7:00PM in the Gathering Place. We will be celebrating Communion this evening.

#### April 7 - Good Friday, 11 AM

At 11 AM, Pastor Jason will lead us in grieving ritual in the Sanctuary and the Sanctuary will be open for personal devotion from 9 AM to 12 PM.

#### **April 9 - Easter Sunday**

Jesus Christ is risen today! Alleluia! The service will include Holy Communion.

## April 16 - International Day of Farmers' Struggles

In John 20:19-31, the resurrected Jesus appears to his disciples, and his friend Thomas asks to touch where the nails were in his hands.

#### **April 23 - Earth Day**

As two of Jesus' disciples were on the road to Emmaus, Jesus appears in his resurrected glory and breaks bread with them (Lk. 24:13-35).

#### April 30 - Fourth Sunday of Easter

In John 10:1-10, we are reminded that Jesus is the good shepherd and the gate we enter into full, eternal, resurrected life here and now.


#### How did your March Madness bracket go?



# Wednesday Night Zoom Bible Study



# **April 2023 Music & Worship News**

Our music ministry has settled back into our routine of choir most Sundays and the Worship Ensemble on our

3<sup>rd</sup> Sunday of the month Emerging service. Thanks to our dedicated and faithful singers and players for helping to "make a joyful noise" in worship through music! It was great seeing the smiles on everyone's faces as soon as Sunny began playing the opening piano intro to *Mr. Rogers' Neighborhood* on our Neighboring Sunday service. Then the next week we took it back to Sunday School or camp by singing "Dry Bones." We'll continue to look for creative ways to worship together, and we hope you find them meaningful.

The Music Outreach Task Force has continued to work with community musical groups to share our space. So far in 2022, we've had the Zen Shakuhachi Concert & Meditation with Grandmaster Cornelius Boots in February, a recital by the students in the studio of ESO concertmaster Galina Istomin, and the spring concert of the Munhall Community Band in March.

We met with the director and manager of the EastShore Chorale, based in Swissvale, about providing meeting and performing space. Our latest communication has them performing a concert in early June, pending Session approval. We have an inquiry from a chamber music ensemble about a possible Memorial Day evening concert; and also up for Session approval at the next meeting is the return of the Treble Choral Festival in the fall, this time hosted by the group Belle Voci. Vocal Confluence (with new addition David Falk!) will hold their Summer Barbershop shows the first weekend of July, and the group I sing with, Voces Solis Summer Singers, will hold a concert in August. This is all in addition to the regular weekly rehearsals of ESO, VC, Milepost6, and Steranka Flute Studio.

Switching back to our worship service, you may or may not have noticed that when we are sharing in the passing of the peace right before the Gathering Song, Pastor Jason walks down and pours water into the baptismal fount. As part of our offering time, we welcome worshipers to come forward during the last hymn to dip their hand in the water to remember their own baptism as well as to drop off their offering in the plate.

Some may recall a couple of years ago, we had a plate made by a potter I found online to match the communion cup I purchased at the Three Rivers Arts Festival a while back. Monica Sommerville graciously donated the plate and did a remarkable job of matching the glaze of the cup that was made by a different potter. Now that we have added this pouring of water into our service, I wanted to find a pitcher that would match the communion elements tying everything together visually. My online search was not very successful. In fact, I even bought something I thought would work only to find that it was about the size of a gravy boat (gotta check dimensions and not just look at photos!). Nothing quite looked like what I was envisioning.

And then it dawned on me that I should contact Sommerville Pottery again and see if Monica had anything we might be able to use. We emailed back and forth several times, and what resulted is that she offered to make several different sized and shaped pitchers and then we could decide if we wanted one for FPCE. I sent the photos to Jason and Lorraine and we all agreed on what we thought looked best. A week later, Monica said the glaze was done and that she was sending them our way.

I asked what the cost would be and she once again very generously gifted these 2 pitchers to our congregation. And they're beautiful – just what we wanted! Take note the next time you're in worship. You'll see the pitcher on a pedestal next to the baptismal fount, and know it was made specially for us by a kind, generous, and talented potter. # **Building Congregational Vitality** WHAT IS CONGREGATIONAL VITALITY?

A community's vitality is primarily its spiritual strength and its capacity for purposeful mission. Congregational vitality is evident in a worshiping community when its structural systems, finances and discipleship practices are aligned in such a way that the community is actively engaged in the mission of God in their local community and the world, and they are powerfully focused on growing as disciples in the way of Jesus Christ. Faith comes alive when we boldly engage God's mission and share the hope we have in Christ.



We propose that there are seven marks to help you determine your current level of vitality — and then various processes for self-assessment, discernment and renewed commitment to the habits that foster an energetic engagement with the Spirit's work in the world.

#### Here are the 7 marks:

- 1. A commitment to forming disciples over every member's lifetime. This leads first to personal transformation, as people put on the heart of Christ, and then to social transformation, as people joyfully go forth into the community and tackle the issues facing today's culture.
- 2. Embracing the call to evangelism. We show forth the love of Christ by our actions and our lives even more than by our words. Our relationships are genuine and caring. People know we are Christians by our love.
- 3. An outward focus. Our church is not a place to escape from the world, but rather our gateway to our community where we may be the hands, feet, heart and mouth of Jesus Christ for people who are suffering or marginalized.
- 4. Empowering every member to discover their individual calling and the gifts God has given them so they can go forth and serve.
- 5. Spirit-inspired worship that challenges, teaches, transforms, convicts and energizes us so when we are sent out, we have experienced the wonder of God and are changed for the better from when we arrived.
- 6. Caring relationships modeled on God's love. We open our doors and hearts to all people, and we build relationships modeled on God's love, which leads to genuine reconciliation and peace.
- 7. Congregations with healthy systems. Our mission focuses are clear. There is fiscal responsibility and accountability. We have thoughtful decision-making structures. Our leaders and staff enjoy a sustainable balance of work/rest time.

#### WHAT DOES OUR FAITH DEMAND?

God's gifts of Word and Sacrament establish and equip the church as the body of Christ in the world. The mission of the church flows from baptism, is nourished at the Lord's Supper, and serves to proclaim the good news of Jesus Christ to all.



Vital communities follow Jesus into places of injustice and struggle. They bear the light of hope, demonstrating love and mercy, and working faithfully for justice and peace. Their efforts will be sustained by personal and congregational patterns and practices of prayer and worship, learning and reflection. They will be stewards of God's abundant gifts in service to God's children here and everywhere. They will demonstrate to the world God's promises and life-giving power in this age and the world to come.

In our worship, learning, relationships, actions and sharing, we work to build congregational vitality.
