WE HAVE TO BEGIN AGAIN

"The Long Walk: A Story of War and the Life that Follows" is the title of a "gripping, contemporary opera" recently performed by the Pittsburgh Opera Company on the stage of the theater of CAPA High School. "Gripping" only hints at the intense emotion and drama we experienced for over two hours with the others in the sold-out auditorium. The opera is a deeply personal exploration of a soldier's return from Iraq where he served as an officer in an Explosive Ordnance Disposal unit and his battle with what he

calls "the Crazy" as he tries to reintegrate into his family life. The opera is Based on the novel by the same title written by Brian Castner. (go to <https://www.pittsburghopera.org/show/the-long-walk> if you want to view an exemplary three-minute clip from the opera).

As the opera comes to a close, the shattered Castner family determinedly sings a piece that demonstrates the resolve and resiliency of the human spirit – *"we have to begin again."*

Brothers, sisters, and friends of FPCE, those words could be sung by us, and mainline congregations across this country. The elderly, wise theologian Walter Brueggemann says something I have been attempting to talk about, preach, and teach for the past four years; *Everyone now agrees that we are at a new season in the life of the North American church, a new season that is starkly different from what was but that has almost taken us by surprise. That new season of dislocation is surely to be seen as a profound challenge to the church."*

Worship Schedule for February

February 4

This Sunday we will be joined by the Boy Scouts from our own Troop 23. The young men in the scout program spend hours being trained, mentored, and encouraged by the scout leaders to become responsible adults. In this morning's readings, we disciples of Jesus are reminded of an often over-looked lesson, which is modeled by Jesus in Mark 1: 29-39.

February 11

Transfiguration Sunday. The living God encountered Jesus, Peter, James, and John and transformed their lives. That same living God will be with us on this Sunday. Two spiritually enriching experiences will form the heart of this service. We will be ordaining and installing officers for the class of 2010 and we will celebrate the Sacrament of the Lord's Supper on this Transfiguration Sunday. The Gospel of Mark gives us a glimpse of what the future holds for those who place their trust in the Risen One. See Mark 9: 2-9 for details.

Pastor's Point of View (cont'd.)

There are many explanations for how we got to this stage in American church life, but the dislocation is unmistakable.

At times, I sit on my back-porch rocking chair and consider all these tectonic shifts across the American landscape. I recall what I thought my ministry would be like when I started seminary in 1980 and what has emerged here in 2017. There are times when I am discouraged, disheartened, and lost.

But, as the Castner family learned, ***we have to begin again.*** In some ways, we do, too. I turn once again to Richard Rohr, an author, retreat leader, and teacher who has worked with the mainline church for longer than I have. He writes, *"There is something the church has learned throughout its history that gives me hope. The word 'change' normally refers to new beginnings. But transformation more often happens not when something new begins but when something old falls apart. The pain of something old falling apart – disruption and chaos – invites the soul to listen at a deeper level. It invites and sometimes forces the soul to go to a new place because the old place is not working anymore."*

In other words, *we have to begin again.* The season of Lent is a good time to do just that. An exciting adventure lies ahead of us.

PREPARING FOR LENT

Most of us wait till the last minute to decide what we will do for Lent to deepen our faith, and we wind up doing the usual: giving up chocolate, etc. (fasting). But Lent calls on us to take part in praying and giving, as well as fasting. We have 2 weeks until the start of Lent; perhaps this will be the year we take on new activities in all three disciplines: read each day's gospel or a new publication (e.g., Upper Room), make a charitable contribution each week, fast from a bad habit...and if you can do it for 6 weeks, who knows?! Lent could be the start of new habits and new blessings.

February 18

The 1st Sunday of Lent will take us into the wilderness. A dry, dark, intimidating place to be. But that is where God does his best work within us. Read Mark 1: 9-15 and Psalm 107 to begin the wilderness journey. We celebrate an Emerging Worship Sunday.

February 25

One of the most courageous decisions to make is the decision to take the voice of God and Jesus seriously. When we do, an incredible adventure unfolds. Read Romans 4: 1-3, 16-22 and Mark 8: 31-38 – do we have the courage of Abraham and Peter?

As of Friday afternoon on January 26, 2018, I was informed that we can get Edgewood Borough permits for both phases of the renovation. I am out of town until March 3, 2018 so details such as cost of permit or any drawing comments will not be known until I return, but a permit will be issued for the HVAC first phase. No contracts will be issued until there is a Session review. FPCE has a line of credit for \$200,000 approved and ready to make withdrawals immediately. More next month.


AN ON-LINE LENTEN COMMUNITY?
