PASTOR'S

POINT
OF
VIEW

Hello sisters and brothers and friends of FPCE,

We are sliding into the summer time. Perhaps we will find a week or two or three to catch our collective breath and have some fun; as in recreation, as in re-creation. I do wish each of you a summer full of blessing and peace.

This past May, I attended a conference for preachers called *The Festival of Homiletics* (which is a fancy word for the art of preaching.) The conference leadership decided to focus on the theme, *Prophetic Preaching in Changing Times*. As the theme suggests, the preaching and teaching we heard was not to make us preachers feel good, or successful, or comforted, or entertained. As I re-read my notes, I see even more clearly that the week's preachers and teachers laid out some tough challenges to those of us in the pulpit on Sunday morning. Here are just a few points that spoke to me:

1. *"The Christian Church in America has reached the height of irrelevance and the pinnacle of importance."* Meaning, the mainline churches find themselves disconnected from much of America, especially from our young generations. Yet, the power of the gospel is the hope of the world. How do we connect the power of that gospel with people who know longer speak our language—and really don't want to. Can the church step out of its own traditions?
2. *Churches loooooove to preach Jesus. But are reluctant to preach what Jesus preached—which is a VERY revolutionary message.*
3. Over and over I heard the prophetic challenge, don't fret so much about how many people are in the pew. Instead, ask yourselves, are the people who do come growing in their discipleship? Does our mission include reaching out to the marginalized...the outsiders?
4. From Alyce McKenzie, Pastor and Professor, described what she sees emerging in our cultural context. As a people we are:

Distracted. Too much going on. We are bombarded by too many messages, too many demands, too much information. How can we help a culture focus?

Story-suspicious: The overarching story of previous generations; the way we interpret the gospel, the way we apply the gospel to our lives used to make sense to most people in our culture. No longer true. The younger people are developing a different story, a different narrative. Can we listen to their story and maybe even try to connect with it?

Scene-loving: Images, Instagram, selfies, photos and videos on Facebook, has become the primary mode of communication.

Wisdom-hungry: No one has the answer for what we as a church and culture need to do next. But really, we don't need answers, we long for wise people to help us discern out next steps.

A lot to think and pray about. The good news? Change happens, but Jesus Christ is the same yesterday, today, and forever.




FRIENDS, READING, & OTHER GREAT STUFF

CAMP SOS – Everything You Need to Know!

You've read a few articles over the past several months. You've heard mention of planning meetings. Maybe you've even talked to a few of the planning team members and gotten some details about this thing... this "not really a Vacation Bible School but still for kids" program we're working on for the summer. Well, here is everything you could possibly want to know about what we've come to call Camp SOS!

What is Camp SOS?

This is our newest effort in outreach to the community. SOS stands for "Summer of Service," and the focus of this first year will be to connect our middle school-aged campers (entering grades 5-8) to people and groups who perform service in our community. We're focusing on areas within walking distance of FPCE so that we don't need to worry about transportation, and to show that service happens all around us.

What types of service will we learn about?

Not everything is 100% confirmed, but our goal in the first 2 days of the camp is to connect with the Edgewood Borough police and fire departments to learn about safety and what is involved in volunteering to help those affected by fire, the Edgewood Library to learn about their programs to improve literacy, our own Deacons and their food pantry for the hungry in our community, Wilkinsburg Community Ministry to learn of their many programs to help those in need, our Scouts who meet at the church and their many service projects, and hopefully the Western Pennsylvania School for the Deaf to see how they provide services and programs for the deaf community.

What will the campers do with this information?

We've front-loaded the week with all of these visits so that the second part of the week can put what the campers learn into action. We're planning a couple of small projects within the church (putting together food bags from the pantry, planting flowers on the side lawn), but the focus of the second part of the week will be creating and performing through making masks, puppets, and writing skits. Campers will get to pick some sort of service to others based on what they've learned and create a short skit. This will be acted out using either puppets created by them in small groups or by acting out the skit using masks they create. Our puppet master Lisa Segedy will guide the campers through the creating and writing process on days 3 and 4 of the camp. The last day will be devoted to sharing what they've learned, rehearsing, and performing their skits for each other and then for friends, family, and community members at a closing community dinner on the side lawn.



When will this happen?

Camp SOS will take place Monday-Friday, July 11-15, 2016 from Noon-6PM. As a service to our community, FPCE has committed to making this a completely FREE experience for campers and their families. Through the assistance of the Wilkinsburg Community Ministry, we will provide a free lunch at the beginning of each day for the campers, and then will conclude with a free meal for campers and their families each day at 5:00. The final day will be a larger celebration that will be another one of our free community meals that includes the campers performing their skits and puppet shows for all in attendance.

How can I help?


If you are interested in volunteering, we need you to contact the office ASAP. We must get your clearances on file (PA state laws changed last year requiring anyone working with children to have clearances, even as a volunteer). We have quick and easy links for these, and if you register as a volunteer online, there is no cost to get the clearances (criminal record check and child abuse clearance). One of them provides instant results and gives you a PDF to print out immediately. The other will be sent to your home within a couple of weeks.

We're happy to have you help as much or as little as you can provide – working lunch or dinner for set up, serving, or clean up, helping with the campers during the day, walking with them on Monday or Tuesday, helping with games or with mask/puppet creation, helping with the pantry/planting projects. All we need to know is what days and times you are available so that we can put a volunteer schedule together to make sure all parts of the camp are covered with enough supervision.

We'll also need donations – food to help fill out the meals, paper products, and a whole list of items listed separately for puppet/mask creation as well as stocking the Deacons' food pantry and even some planting tools. See the "Donations Needed" article.

What's next?

We have sent out over 1,200 flyers to students in the Woodland Hills Intermediate Center (grades 4-6), 7th graders at the Jr./Sr. High School, 4th-7th graders at Woodland Hills Academy, and The Environmental Charter School in Regent Square. So now we eagerly wait for the registrations to come in! We're planning to invite the campers to attend our July 6th community meal so that they can meet the Camp SOS counselors & staff.



Additionally, we're asking that anyone who volunteers comes to a short training/orientation meeting (date/time TBD, but it will be some time between July 7 and the start of camp) to go over the schedule, vision for the week, and expectations of the campers (and consequences if they aren't followed).

We're very excited about the possibilities this may open up for us as a congregation in our efforts to be the "community church." While the focus isn't specifically evangelism or Christian Education, we feel that we are living out our mission (to love our neighbors) by modeling Christ-like behavior in exposing the younger generation in our community to the ways of serving and helping others.

We hope that this will be a spring-board to more efforts to serve outward into the community, bringing in youth and families in need to be a part of our FPCE family. Eventually, we'd love to expand to form a regular meeting of the campers in somewhat of a "youth group" format, keeping their connections moving forward. The goal with Camp SOS into the future is to expand beyond just learning about service, but DOING it, with hopes of finding tangible service projects to be a focus of the camp while still having fun with games and activities. And if the puppet and mask thing takes off, we may find ourselves with a community puppet/theater ministry complete with acting classes, puppet making, and regular performances either during worship or for the community. The possibilities are exciting and could be an energized way of moving FPCE forward into a new chapter. We hope you'll jump on board and be a part of it!






- Congratulations to Charlie Baldwin. Charlie graduated from Lehigh College on the weekend of May 21.
