

The end is where we start from. For Christians, death is where we start from. "Unless a grain of wheat falls into the ground and dies, it remains alone; but if it dies it bears much fruit." So Jesus teaches. The end is where we start from. Death is where we start from. Three times Jesus told the disciples what the future held for him, "The Son of Man is about to be delivered into the hands of men, and they will kill him, and he will be raised on the third day." The disciple Peter rejected these words outright; the other disciples were deeply distressed. They were not yet able to see that beyond the dying we begin a new life! A new, redeemed, joyful life with God

BIG CHALLENGES DEMAND BIG IDEAS

We have talked about this before. Many times. The elders have discussed, debated, prayed, wondered, grieved, and sat silently before the challenge God has placed before us, the members and friends of the First United Presbyterian Church of Edgewood. Big building. Small congregation. Big expenses. Fewer contributions. (But thank you to those who do give regularly and generously!)

Big challenges demand big ideas

We could sit on our hands, bury our heads in our Bibles, hymnals, or hands and pray that God would change things...and go on doing what we have always done before. Other congregations have done that. In many cases, the result is a large, lovely, historic, empty building that serves as a growing place for weeds and vines.

The leadership of this church does not want that to happen to us. Subsequently, we are thinking big thoughts way outside the box. I will give some examples, but admit the details are sketchy at this point. Still to be decided. And voted on – by you. In fact, your ideas and thoughts will always be welcome. We may not follow through as you would wish, but we will listen to you carefully and give serious thought to your hopes, dreams, and ideas.

Here are some of the ideas being discussed:

Share one pastor with another congregation or two.

Change our worship service style to become less Presbyterian, less predictable, and more spontaneous.

Invite even more outside groups to use our facility a la the Edgewood Day Care on our second floor. The groups would help pay for the upkeep of the building and utilities.

Sell some of our facility to a real estate developer but maintain our worship space and a meeting area.

Hope that another congregation merges with us as the Mulberry congregation did twenty years ago.

Sell our building to a developer and 1. move into a smaller, affordable facility or, 2. rent a community center – like the Edgewood Club – and have Sunday morning services there or, 3. merge with another nearby church – like 2nd Presbyterian of Wilkinsburg or Waverly Presbyterian.

Big challenges demand big ideas. Please keep the leadership of FPCE in your prayers.

CHURCHILL CHARTER SCHOOL PRESENTATION

7:00 p.m. on Monday, April 8 in the Gathering Place

A group of Churchill residents, educators, with the approval of the Woodland Hills School District will be presenting a plan to open a Charter School for gifted students in September 2020. Representatives from the Charter School will welcome questions and concerns after their presentation. The session agreed to allow the use of space for this presentation to the community; however the approval for the use of the building does not imply a promotion of the charter school by the church. This is simply an effort to make our space available for community organizations.

MUSIC MINISTRY REPORT 2018

Typically when preparing this report each year, I look back to our monthly newsletter to refresh my memory as to what has taken place from all the way back in January. This year, as I scrolled through the 2018 issues of *News from the Edge*, I noticed that I didn't write much. I suppose "no news is good news" would fit here?

We have a wonderful music ministry here at Edgewood. The talent in our congregation amazes me constantly, and I sometimes forget how lucky we are to have folks like Sunny in our midst every week. We take for granted that the hymns will be played well on both the organ and piano, that our section leaders will confidently lead us, that the choir will sing in tune, and that the worship ensemble will make a meaningful emerging service. It's just become who we are as the Edgewood congregation. We are truly blessed.

The year 2018 continued our goal to enhance worship in as many ways as possible. Pastor Michael and I discuss scripture verses and themes regularly, and I work meticulously to tie the music in with that message, trying to keep the tradition of great hymns and Presbyterian heritage while at the same time expanding our musical vocabulary as a congregation, testing out new styles, tunes, and texts.

We've experienced the introspective music from the Taizé and Iona communities through repetitive, chant-like songs. We've added percussion and rhythm to multicultural songs of praise. We've been treated to beautiful piano accompaniment of folk tunes and hymns. The choir has shared a cappella selections; Mandy and I have shared solos and duets; and we've had any combination of instruments in our emerging services.

During the summer, as we've done the past few years, we moved worship to the cool Gathering Place. I personally really enjoy the intimate setting of having everyone close together, feeling like a true worship family. It's reminiscent of the old Wednesday night "Edge" service we had years ago.

As a larger community, we've welcomed groups from outside our walls to share music in our space. The Edgewood Symphony along with the Renaissance City Choirs shared the holiday spirit with a full house in December. And just before Christmas, you were all gracious enough to allow me to bring my students from North Hills High School to share music during and after our Advent worship.

As we transition into the 2019 year full of challenges for our small congregation, I hope that we can continue to keep music as a vital ministry at Edgewood in as many ways as possible. I know we will be testing out months without organ in an effort to be fiscally responsible, but I also want to make sure we remember our rich musical traditions as we move forward. None of us knows what the "right" answer or combination of answers is to keep the mission and ministry at FPCE alive, but we must trust that God has a plan for all of us. May we continue to "make a joyful noise unto the Lord" for as long as we can!

CHRISTIAN EDUCATION REPORT

CE's mission has continued to focus not only on school age children, but to provide our adults, both members and nonmembers, with opportunities to deepen their relationship with God and one another. No matter your age or stage, there is a place for everyone to grow in faith.

During 2018, FPCE's Christian Education has included:

Youth Day Care- Lorraine Douthett and Rhonda Apessos, with Nancy Ernst on call, were available as needed in the nursery during Service to watch over our youngest attendees and engage in simple meaningful Christian instruction through play.

Youth Sunday School – Again Lorraine and Rhonda taught school age children in attendance during Service, lessons based on the lectionary utilizing the "Sermons 4 Kids" curriculum with games and puzzles. Often the school age children helped with the preschool kids and we enjoyed beautiful fellowship with our youth.

Confirmation Class – Pastor Michael led our newest members in a confirmation class culminating in the Confirmation of Spencer Lehrian and Jake Santo on April 29, 2018. All in attendance were moved by the wise and heartfelt Affirmation of Faith given by each Confirmand. Surely, the Spirit was with us.

Adult Sunday School – This group meets before Service in the lounge. Pastor Michael leads a small group in vibrant discussions based on Bible Study Books and current events.

Tuesday Morning Book Group – This small group is led by Pastor Michael and meets weekly at the home of Rhonda Apessos. The group democratically chooses subjects and themes it wishes to explore. This year we studied the lives of the early Apostles before turning to an advent theme. 2018 book selections included Lion of God: Dear and Glorious Physician; The Fisherman; and Two from Galilee.

Wednesday Evening Bible Study – This group met throughout the year, studying a variety of books and was led by Pastor Michael on some very meaningful discussions.

We are enthusiastic to continue the above programs in 2019 and have dreams of starting a new women's bible study, which will simultaneously be a traditional bible study but also incorporate modern elements using some of the newest books by our most popular leaders and incorporate modern technology. We also plan on celebrating a Youth Sunday in the Spring.

WORSHIP COMMITTEE REPORT

Weekly for Sunday worship services at FPCE in 2018 held steady at 30-45 faithful Christians. We celebrated the sacrament of Communion on the first Sunday of every month, on Maundy Thursday, Easter Sunday and Christmas Eve. Once a month in Emerging Services we enjoyed a more informal worship style featuring musical accompaniment by our 'house band' with musicians and instruments varying from month to month.

Lent worship began with a service on Ash Wednesday. During Holy week we celebrated the traditional Palm Sunday service and Maundy Thursday service focusing on the sacrifice of Jesus and celebration of the Lord's Last Supper. The sanctuary was opened through Good Friday for anyone wishing to use the space for prayer and quiet reflection. Then the glory of the resurrection was celebrated on Easter Sunday.

On Pentecost we celebrated the birthday of the church when the miracle of the Holy Spirit visiting the Apostles gave them ability to communicate in other languages and spread the word of the gospel.

Summer worship hours at 10:00AM began in June and we worshiped in the ore intimate air-conditioned Gathering Place. In September we returned to 11:00AM worship services our newly air-conditioned sanctuary. World Communion Sunday was observed on the first Sunday in October as we joined in spirit with Christians all over the world in sharing the communion of the Lord's Supper.

After services on November 26 many stayed after services and participated in the traditional Hanging of the Greens, decorating the sanctuary for Advent and Christmas. Christmas Eve Candlelight service was well attended, and the service went smoothly, though there was some behind the scenes scrambling when changes to the service were required due to the unexpected illness and absence of scheduled participants. 2018 worship ended quietly on December 29 with a service of lessons and carols.
