Wilkinsburg Community Ministry -Mission in our Back Yard

You hear it mentioned almost weekly in our worship services. We've mentioned our partnership with them for years. They are the largest portion of our mission budget. But do you know what WCM does for the community just a few blocks away?

Wilkinsburg Community Ministry provides services to approximately 5,000 residents per year, including senior citizens, citizens with disabilities, at-risk youth, and families who are economically challenged, unemployed, under-employed or facing emergency situations. The outcomes of our programs include reducing hunger in Wilkinsburg, ensuring the health and well-being of our senior citizen neighbors, helping economically-challenged families have basic necessities, such as food, diapers, clothing, and heat in their homes, and keeping Wilkinsburg streets safer through partnerships with educational and after-school youth programs. WCM is a collaboration of seven area churches, with members of the board representing each of the churches. In 1968, a number of clergy and lay leaders from ten congregations formed the Board of Directors for the Wilkinsburg Community Ministry. The unity of several congregations makes it possible for WCM to meet the extreme needs of poverty and hunger in our community and provide effective community services to all persons regardless of race, religion, gender, sexual orientation and creed.

WCM Mission: Wilkinsburg Community Ministry, a non-profit supported by area residents and congregations, responds to persistent needs of all faiths, addressing the human service crises in our community.

Wilkinsburg Community Ministry Programs include:

- Youth Meal Partnership we prepare meals for school-aged children through after-school, summer, and special needs program partnerships;
- **Urban Survival Program** helps families in tough situations through several initiatives: Emergency Food Pantry, Holiday Food Distribution, Clothing and Household Donations, SNAP Assistance, Energy Assistance and other Social Services.
- **Our Warm Hearts initiative**, with our partners at KnitOne. coordinates volunteer knitters and crocheters throughout Allegheny County to make hats, mittens and gloves for children. These are distributed through the school district, specifically through Kelly and Turner schools. This year we will also distribute some to crossing guards and bus drivers.

We welcome you to get involved in the Wilkinsburg community by volunteering and/or making a donation. We appreciate your support and interest in making our community a better place to live, work, pray, and play. WCM Backpack Program

FPCE has helped WCM in previous years with the purchase and assembly of backpacks stuffed with items needed for Wilkinsburg students returning to school. Here is a note from WCM Director Ruth Kittner about the program this year:

"Hi all, Kerry at Kelly has said that they <u>do</u> need the backpacks and school supplies and hygiene kits. Regardless of how classes are run this year, kids will need these things to keep their stuff together. There are about 560 kids. I usually order the bags and kits separately, but given that there won't be any assembly space or community assembly, I can order everything pre-asse

any assembly space or community assembly, I can order everything pre-assembled. Our budget for this is \$2,500, so I'm going ahead and doing this. I'd like to add another \$650 for wholesale hand sanitizer. It's still hard (impossible?) to buy in regular stores. I hope the Board will approve this additional expense. For those of you with Congregations who want to collect hygiene items, Combs/brushes, tooth brushes (individual, and for little kids), tooth paste, soap, hand soap, wash clothes, hand towels, hair ornaments, small tissue packets, shampoo and conditioner (small and large bottles), hand and/or body lotion. There is also always a need for socks and underwear. Boys sizes 6-14 Girls sizes 4-16 "Socks child sizes: Toddler size L, Child size S-L Ankle socks, crew socks. Cotton or cotton blend is best."

If you would like to participate by providing some of the needed items or a donation to help pay for the backpacks, please bring hygiene items to the side entry hall of the church or directly to WCM, 702 Wood Street, Pittsburgh, PA 15221. Check donations may be sent to FPCE marked "Backpacks."



F.R.O.G.S. AFTER SCHOOL PROGRAM FRIENDS, READING, & OTHER GREAT STUFF



Financial Update

As of June 30, the income and expenses for FPCE are as follows:

Total Income - \$112,383.08 actual (YTD Budget - \$110,767.54)

Total Expense - \$112,865.13 actual (YTD Budget - \$122,068.25)

For both income and expenses FPCE is doing well considering the difficult current conditions. Although the budget for Donations 4010 has declined over the last several years, this year we are doing well and are about \$2,000 over budget. Since the church has been closed for the last three months, expenses have been below normal, especially utilities. This accounts for net income being \$10,818.66 over budget. All salaries have

been maintained and we have received a loan of \$19,500.00 from the Payroll Protection Program, which should be forgiven in August. In addition, Pastor Michael's retirement on June 30, 2020 will reduce personnel expenses, even after a part time pastor position is filled. FPCE is fortunate to have a committed congregation that has maintained support of the church during this period of change.

COVID-19 Safety Precautions for Recording Sessions

- The sanctuary is cleaned before and after each recording session, including wiping the pews, door handles, etc.
- Hand sanitizer is available at multiple stations. There is a touchless dispenser at the side door, and we are ordering additional touchless dispensers.
- We ask that you wear a mask when in the building.
- We ask that you stay home if experiencing any of the symptoms identified by the CDC.

Prayer Warriors

Did you know that we have a dedicated group that prays for you constantly? A core group of FPCE members maintain a prayer list that is continually updated as joys and concerns are passed along in the life of our congregation. They set aside intentional time and pray for specific individuals or situations that are brought to their attention and follow up on those prayer requests with calls and emails. Our Online Adventures

The COVID Crisis forced everyone to become instant experts in digital communication. Teachers converted lessons into online formats, recording videos, setting up Google Classrooms. Companies instituted remote working procedures. Zoom was no longer a word that was whispered in a Mazda commercial but rather a way to hold meetings, virtual happy hours, family group chats, and more. Late night TV hosts began doing their shows from home. And of course, the church had to adapt as well.

When we began the closures, physically meeting in the church was not something we were able to do. There was exposure in the Sakai household due to Ted's hospital work, and Sunny had to self-quarantine for 2 weeks. But we wanted church to take place. So, I made us a SoundCloud channel and began creating audio versions of our service. Pastor Michael recorded a voice memo on his phone doing all of the spoken parts of the worship, Sunny recorded herself playing the hymns, which she emailed me, then I recorded myself singing overtop of her track. Then I put it all in GarageBand and made it seem like we were all in the room together doing a regular worship service. Technology is pretty cool, huh?

Michael felt he needed to provide spiritual guidance since this was all new for all of us. His weekly emails became almost daily inspirational messages and check-ins to see how we were doing. In the absence of a choir and regular worship, Sunny and I began recording hymns and anthems, and I posted regular videos to keep us connected musically. Our presence on Facebook and Instagram increased dramatically.



By the time May arrived, we felt we could finally begin doing videos of our services in person, in the sanctuary. While many churches are doing a live streaming version of their worship at the time they would normally meet in person, we didn't yet have the equipment to pull that off. So, we began what is now our regular schedule of recording on Fridays, which I then edit to include all of the responses and hymns before posting on YouTube and emailing to everyone. A special shout-out to elder John Foster for meeting us each week and running the camera!

Once Allegheny County moved to the green phase allowing group gatherings, and after MUCH discussion with the Worship Committee, we compromised with offering an in-person experience socially distanced in the sanctuary to anyone interested when we record. The largest group we have had so far is 5, but that's ok!

So now, here we are in August. The virus is dictating how we live our lives. As cases increase, more restrictions are put in place. Schools and Universities are trying to decide how best to get students back in class. Musical organizations and sports teams are canceling whole seasons or making dramatic changes to how they function. While we search for a pastor, I've assumed the duties of sending out emails (which I hope you find meaningful and helpful in your spiritual lives). I thought it was worth sprucing up and updating our website since we're basically trying to sell a virtual version of our congregation to a potential new leader. If you go to fpcedgewood.org, you'll notice a nice, clean, and modern new look, with more current photos, and updated content to reflect our activities, events, and ministries over the past couple of years. Any updates or messages that are sent out via email are posted on the website, Facebook, Twitter, and Instagram.

We don't know how long this will go on...both the pandemic and our search! What we do know is that we have an amazing guide who gifts us with talents to continue the work of the kingdom in whatever way works best at the time. One of the hymns we have used as a gathering song (which I just realized was written by our own Pastor to Pittsburgh Presbytery, Sheldon Sorge!) paraphrases Psalm 62 as follows:

"God is my rock; God is my strength; God is my salvation, my refuge, my abiding peace. I shall not be shaken."

May we rely on that rock for strength as we keep moving forward as the family of faith in Edgewood.
