Advent 'reorients us to the radical hope of the gospel'

Before Thanksgiving is even finished, people are inundated with the sights and sounds of Christmas. Within this consumer culture, it's easy to confuse the season of Advent with the number of shopping days until December 25.



"In Christian tradition, Advent challenges us to think about time in a much deeper way," said the Rev. Dr. David Gambrell, in the Office of Theology and Worship of the Presbyterian Church (U.S.A.) "Advent asks us: What are we really waiting and hoping for? How long will evil, injustice and violence continue? What is God doing in the world? How can we in the church prepare for the coming of God's righteousness, justice and peace?"

Gambrell says Advent has a double focus which "reorients us to the radical hope of the gospel."

The season begins with the church crying out with prophets and apostles, praying for God's holy realm to come quickly. As the days of Advent draw to a close, the church rejoices with the gospel writers, celebrating the one who has already come into the world to save us.

"Jesus Christ has come to transform the world — and is coming again to complete the work of God's new creation," he says. "So, we begin the Christian year by looking ahead to the end of the story, the time when God will wipe away every tear."

For the Rev. Dr. Kimberly Bracken Long, editor of Presbyterian Mission Agency's "Call to Worship," this is the hope on which Christians stake their lives.

"While many in the church are familiar with the idea of Advent as a season of waiting, counting the days until we celebrate the birth of Jesus," she explains, "there is a much deeper waiting and deeper yearning — of watching in expectation for Christ to come again."

"God's justice is coming," says Long, "and with it, God's peace."

December 18: Fourth Sunday of Advent: LOVE; Matthew 1:18-25 shares how an angel appeared to Joseph saying that Mary will give birth to "God-withus." The North Hills Singers will be joining us for worship and offering a mini concert following the service.

Wednesday, December 21: Blue Christmas will be held at Waverly Presbyterian Church at 7:00PM. The relentless joy and cheer of the Christmas season can offer further alienation to folks already struggling with financial problems, broken relationships, or unresolved grief. This is a mournful, somber service offered to stand in solidarity with those in pain.

CHRISTMAS EVE, Saturday, December 24: Nativity of the Lord; Join us at 8:00PM for a candlelight and communion service, celebrating the incarnation of Jesus—God-Enfleshed Among Us!

December 25: Christmas Day at home! There will be NO in-person worship this morning. Please join us on Facebook and YouTube from the comfort of your home. The pre-recorded service will "go live" at 11:00AM and then will be available to watch any time after that.

Jolly Old Saint Nicholas... of Myra

My favorite Christmas movie is the 1970 stop motion special *Santa Claus is Comin' to Town* by Rankin/Bass Productions. Based on the song of the same name, the film tells the story of how things came to be: who is Santa? where did the elves come from? why does he go down chimneys? From the Winter Warlock to the Burgermeister Meisterburger, it's a classic, but it begs the question: Who truly was St. Nicholas?



Unfortunately, we know very little, and much of what we know is disputed. Around 270 CE, he was born in Patara, an ancient city on the coast of modern-day Turkey. When his parents died, he used his inheritance to help the poor, the hungry, and the sick.

The most famous legend tells of a man and his three daughters. The man was quite wealthy, but after an attack on a trading ship, he lost all his wealth. Desperate, he prayed that God would save his daughters from poverty, for he did not have enough money for dowries. This custom and tradition is quite foreign to us today, but in Nicholas's time, fathers had to offer something of value to prospective husbands—the dowry.

Not hearing a response from God, the father decided he would have to either sell his eldest daughter into slavery or force her into prostitution to bring in money to support his other two daughters. Word of this spread throughout the community, and Nicholas decided to do something. He knew the family would not accept his gift, so in the middle of the night, he threw a bag of gold through an open window. The crisis was averted! And the eldest daughter was able to marry, using the bag of gold as the dowry. However, the father eventually faced the same predicament with his second daughter. Again, a bag of gold mysteriously appeared overnight. She married. And finally, he faced the issue with his third daughter, and a bag of gold appeared again. She married, too.

The legend says on the final night when the gold appeared, the father woke up—strongly suspecting that a human had been God's instrument in saving his two older daughters—and chased after Nicholas. Catching up to him, the father knelt and tried to kiss Nicholas's feet, but Nicholas stopped him, saying that God alone should be thanked for the three bags of gold. Joe L. Wheeler writes, "Gradually, the people of that region became aware that among them was a selfless human being who went about doing good and directing all praise and gratitude to God." (Saint Nicholas, p. 15).

When Nicholas had given all his inherited wealth away, he entered the monastery of Sion, near the town of Myra. Eventually, he became abbot (the leader of the monastery), and later, he became a priest and the bishop of Myra.

This holiday season, let us be blessings to others. Let us give generously, not expecting anything in return, for all that we call our own is truly God's. When we give to others, let us do so joyfully and in secret.


At their November meeting, Session approved the following:



Our annual food donation to our food pantry and WCM and others from Shady Side Academy 2nd graders and their teachers was again a HUGE success. The bus load arrived Friday morning, Nov. 18 and the students/teachers started their routine of unloading their bus and loading our shelves. Deacon Rick Masten then talked with them and explained how their generosity will help so many people who are in need. Their collection will be divided between our food pantry, WCM and other local charities.

In addition to our food pantry, we are working to set up **"Our Little Pantry"** at entrances to the church for those who might be in need of food. We invite anyone to take what they need or give any extra they have. We hope making the food pantry more accessible to those who use our building throughout the week will help us live out our mission better—to love our neighbors well.

An Update from WCM

On behalf of Wilkinsburg Community Ministry, we thank you for previous gifts to provide nutritious food for our neighbors in Wilkinsburg, Edgewood, Swissvale and Homewood. WCM distributes approximately 500 pounds of fresh fruits and vegetables <u>per day</u> to 45-60 families who visit our store front pantry; in addition, our neighbors can select various canned, dried and frozen items, including vegetables, soups, beans and rice, and frozen or refrigerated meats, cheeses, milk, and eggs. We also usually have various types of bread and the occasional sweet treats.

Our neighbors find it increasingly difficult to meet their nutrition, housing and security needs. This is not simply a local crisis. You've no doubt heard that the numbers of families living with food insecurity have increased during the health and economic crisis. Experts estimate that 50 million families in the country are food insecure now: that number includes about 30 million children and another 40 million seniors A combination of inflation and price gouging have had a long-term negative impact on the nation's food systems.

In Fall 2022, WCM initiated a new project which brings food to local neighborhoods. In partnership with the Greater Pittsburgh Community Food Bank, we have a 27 foot step truck which will, eventually, have 5-6 stops a week at several locations to serve neighbors who cannot come to our store front pantry during regular hours (9-1 M-F). Presently "We Share Food" is operating at two locations in Wilkinsburg; we plan to expand to a third location in November, and two more in January 2023. A each stop we are distributing about 1500 pounds of food in 3-4 hours.

WCM's additional programs specifically focus on Wilkinsburg children. Operation Backpack, an annual event to provides backpacks to school children. They use these to carry their books during the week and to take home food for the weekend. The Medicine Way Garden has evolved into a children's learning center focused on how food grows, composting, pollination, and gardening. Our partnershipp with the childcare center across the street offers an outdoor space for children to experiment with gardening, enjoy getting their fingers into dirt, and watch worms, fish, pollinators and birds. Both programs encourage children to think about nutrition and understand the food chain in which we all live.

There are several ways you can participate in the WCM mission:

*We always seek volunteers to help at both the store front pantry and the mobile pantry. Volunteers typically work 2-4 hour shifts helping people make their food choices, stocking the shelves, and processing donations of food. Some lifting is involved.

*Some volunteers host small neighborhood "missions" at which they gather 7-10 friends to collect canned and packaged goods. One of our staff or board members is happy to come to these events to share the word on food (in)security in our county.

*Financial support is always welcome! There are several ways to make a gift.
