PASTOR'S PASTOR'S

Hello FPCE family,

Here comes summertime! My oh my, January and February Sunday mornings were challenging. Ice. Snow. Cold. As the saying goes, "This too shall pass." (George Harrison composed a beautiful, lyrical tribute to that truism by the way.)

It is not often that I expect spiritual truths to be intoned by the DJ's on WAMO radio.; my daughter's favorite station.

The other day, the morning DJ startled me when he said, "Hey people, do you ever feel like life is piling on? Do you feel sometimes that the load you carry is too heavy to bear? When that happens to me, and it is happening to me these days, I think about my favorite movie—"The Passion of Christ" by Mel Gibson. And when I worry about how hard my life is, I just think about what that man Jesus endured for us....and my difficulties get into perspective." I listened to that brief testimony on WAMO radio and thought, that DJ just shared the gospel with more unchurched people than I have spoken to in nearly 35 years of ministry!

And what he said—so true.

When we feel like life is piling on, it is so easy for us to slip into feelings of self-pity or anger or helplessness or depression and anxiety. And when I enter into my depressed/anxious way of being, I recall the words of Paul in his letter to the Philippians: "The Lord is near. Do not worry about anything, but in everything by prayer and supplication with thanksgiving let your requests be known to God. And the peace of God, which surpasses all understanding, will guard your hearts and your minds in Christ Jesus."

Powerful words of truth. More easily read than accomplished, to be sure. But trust those words, brothers and sisters.

One of the great preachers of the church in the 19th century is a man named Charles Spurgeon. He once said, "Anxiety does not empty tomorrow of its sorrows, but only empties today of its strength.."


Keep on keeping on, good people. As I said in this morning's sermon (from Julia of Norwich)...."All shall be well, all shall be well, and all manner of things shall be well."



It's hard to believe another church programming year has come and gone already. As I write this, all of those important and memorable events are taking place in the lives of high schoolers... prom, senior banquets, our final concerts, awards

nights, final exams, and, of course, graduation. It's always so bittersweet to be at that final ceremony, that commencement, as the students begin the next chapters of their lives while remembering all of the wonderful times shared together during their 4 years of high school. I'm blessed to have that as my day job.

I'm equally blessed and humbled to serve you all as Minister of Music, and am grateful that we have such dedicated volunteers and staff in our music ministry to continue making a joyful noise unto the Lord while providing the best worship experience we can to glorify our God. Over the past 9 months or so, we've shared in a multitude of worship and music styles, from our classic and emerging services, to a bit of Taize and Iona reflection, sung responsive Psalms, to brand new songs as well as the return of some old familiar tunes.

Our worship ensemble members for Emerging services are troopers. We've been somewhat unpredictable with availability in the past few months, so each time we gather for rehearsal, we played a mini game of musical chairs to see who was playing which instrument and who might end up behind a microphone singing! The choir has faithfully come for rehearsal and singing of our weekly anthem during classic services, sometimes with barely more than a quartet, and some Sundays with a full complement of voices.

We opened our doors to many female singers, their friends and families at the Women's Choral Festival in November (and I think they want us to host again in 2015!), shared in worship with the North Hills Singers in December, were treated to special music by Inori Sakai when she is home to share her gifts, and played host to the annual ESO Holiday Concert with the Renaissance City Choirs.

One quick note: you've likely noticed me playing a little more frequently with the sound board at the front of the church. That's because we have a new power amp (thanks to Jim Segedy's donation) and the settings aren't quite the same as the one we had before. I can only test so much in an empty room...once bodies fill the pews, some of the sound changes and I have to make adjustments as we go so that you don't hear feedback. I hope to have the "tweaks" ironed out in the next couple of weeks. The pulpit microphone, however, should sound clearer than ever. It was replaced just before Easter and has vastly improved hearing God's Word proclaimed in scripture and sermon from the pulpit. Little by little, we're making progress!

As we move to our summer worship schedule, we plan to make it out on the lawn at least once or twice (and hopefully it will actually happen if the weather cooperates this year!), and will have the anthem space available if there are those of you out there hoping to share a gift of song with us. Sunny, Tyler, Mandy, and I will provide weekly song leadership as schedules permit with vacations, and the choir will likely make an appearance in at least one "family reunion" Sunday. Let me know if you want to be a part of the schedule.
