
MAUNDY THURSDAY

with forced air and ductless furnaces. In the February 20, 2018 Session meeting the vote was unanimous to proceed with Phase 1. In March we will secure the PHLF loan and get final contractor bids so contracts can be signed and the furnace installation will begin.

This phase has the positive effect of reducing costs in gas consumption and maintenance to partially offset the project costs. We will keep you informed of the ongoing process.

PRAISE THE LORD AND LET THE RENOVATION BEGIN!

At its February meeting the session received the report from Tom Ochs that all preliminary work had been completed and all loans, approvals and permits obtained. Should we or should we not proceed? The elders paused (yet again) to think about whether or not we really should move forward with the first phase of the renovation, installation of a new heating and cooling system. After discussion, the vote to push the GO button was unanimous. The session recognizes this is a bold step for a smaller congregation. But the alternative – to do nothing and allow the facility to fall into a state of disrepair – is neither wise or responsible stewardship.

GRIEF SUPPORT GROUP

First Presbyterian Church of Edgewood will host a grief support group for those grieving the loss of a loved one. The monthly group will be open to members of the congregation as well as the public. It will be led by Chaplain Virginia Mayo, M.S. Ed. Counseling, M.A. Theology, of Anova Hospice and Palliative Care. Most of you already know Virginia from her previous preaching at FPCE.

The intent of the group will be partly educational about the grief process and mostly supportive in working through feelings of loss. The work of grief is hard and cannot be hurried, but it can be reassuring to feel connected with a group. Spring is a wonderful time to open oneself to a new experience. Hope is what softens our feelings and gives us the belief that life can be worth living again.

MOMENT FOR STEWARDSHIP

Christian Moralistic Therapeutic Deism

Moralistic Therapeutic Deism (MTD) is a term coined by Christian Smith and Melinda Denton. MTD first appeared in their book "Soul Searching: The Religious and Spiritual Lives of American Teenagers" (2005). In my opinion, MTD is not limited to teenagers and young adults but may be applicable to all generations. MTD may be summarized as follows:

A god watches over human life on earth, but he is far away.

God wants us to be good people.

The main goal in life is to be happy and feel good about oneself.

Since this god is far away, he is not particularly involved in our lives. At the same time, MTDeists do not want him to be involved in their lives either. God only participates when there is a major problem.

All good people go to heaven.

Smith and Denton state that Christianity in the USA is only tenuously Christian in its true form and has morphed into Christian MTD. In her 2010 book, "Almost Christian: What the Faith of Our Teenagers is Telling the American Church," Kenda Creasy Dean writes "The problem does not seem to be that churches are teaching young people badly, but that we are doing an exceedingly good job of teaching youth what we really believe, namely, that Christianity is not a big deal, that God requires little, and the church is a helpful social institution filled with nice people... If churches practice MTD in the name of Christianity, then getting teenagers to church more often is not the solution (conceivably it could make things worse). A more faithful church is the solution..."

What does this have to do with stewardship? Actually, quite a bit. In contrast to MTDists, we Christians believe in a living God who came to us in human form 2000 years ago. He communed with us, lived for us, died for us, and rose for us. He sent the Holy Spirit and continues to pray for us. The more we realize His presence in our midst, the more we become mindful of how we spend our time, resources, and money. Giving and tithing become a natural part of our relationship with God.

Do you know of a MTDist who can benefit from knowing the Lord? Perhaps you can help that person.
