Hello members, friends, and relatives of FPCE,

Spring is springing up all around us. After the mercurial weather pattern of March and April, I'm sure most of us long for seasonable temperatures and an end to the coughing and sniffing that many of us are enduring (and probably sharing with one another.)

Let's talk stewardship. Let's talk about this large, lovely, and costly edifice we call our church home.

When I arrived in October, 2012, Brad Masten served as chair of the stewardship committee. He did so with gentle prodding and a sense of humor. After Brad stepped aside, Paul Ohori gamely took on the role of stewardship chair. I have appreciated Paul's educational and creative approach to the call for all of us to be stewards. When it comes to caring for the property and finances of our fellowship, Dan Mielke and Time McGee, elders on the Property ministry team are doing a bang-up job. The books are in the capable and responsible hands of Tom Ochs and Pam Thompson. A big "thank you" is in order for all of them.

I would like to make one point perfectly clear—stewardship is not only about fundraising and turning in a pledge card in November. To be sure, that is an important part of fulfilling the call to stewardship, but only a part. Stewardship is a way of life.

Stewardship is God's call for each one of us to be responsible caretakers of the gifts, talents, and resources that God has given us. The resources of God are not distributed evenly. All of us are to **"contribute to the needs of the saints"** (by the way, in the New Testament, all of us are saints.) But, some of us have been blessed with many resources. Paul challenges those who have been blessed with much to **"give generously."** 

Clearly, when we consider this church building, we have been given much. The sanctuary is a striking and meaningful work of art. The first floor provides us with plenty of room to have fellowship, classes, and potlucks. The lower level has so may rooms that I still get lost down there! The side yard is a place for children to play, a community to picnic and a congregation to worship. We have been given much, and from us, much is expected.

The building renovation is a stewardship issue. How are we called to use this place and all of this space? How can we best care for it? How can it become a resource not only for us but for the community? How can the beauty and strength of this structure be used to advance the Kingdom of God that Jesus ushered into this world?

It is true—putting together the drawings and specs for us to look at is taking longer than we anticipated. Can we think of this waiting time as an opportunity for prayerful discernment and not a time to feel anxious and frustrated? When it comes to our call to the stewardship of this facility—let us pray. # About the Renovation Proposal

For the renovation, we must remember that we are dealing with a 100 year building and we are evaluating substantial changes. When the final report is issued, we will all be part of the process to understand the changes, evaluate the costs and make decisions about the feasibility of these changes being part of our growth in future years. Regardless of the final decision, as a church we should be looking optimistically to the future with the intent to grow our numbers and expand our mission.

Since the funds were approved to hire an architect to develop plans for the program area, sanctuary and HVAC, it was necessary to get detailed drawing of the building, survey the electrical and mechanical systems, determine how to relocate the large electrical panel by the men's bathroom, have a structural engineer evaluate the modifications needed for the ADA lift and have many discussion on the sanctuary platform. There have been discussions on the best method to replace the steam boiler and the most efficient way to service a building where most of the rooms are only occupied a few hours a week. We have had five HVAC contractors visit the church for consultation. The architect has also been backlogged resulting in drawings time taking longer than expected. Although there may be some impatience, for a project such as this a slow approach has its advantages because it helps avoid quick decision that may not be the best in the longer term.

At the present time, we are expecting to receive drawings in the next 2-3 weeks. Because the HVAC encompasses the whole building, we think it may be best to separate that from the program room/sanctuary platform changes. The current distribution of forced air furnaces would allow the HVAC to be installed before those changes are implemented. Of course, before any changes are approved or any contracts issues everyone will have the opportunity to review the changes proposed, the cost associated with those changes and how they will be funded.

When this project started the goal was to reconfigure the first floor to provide a program space that fit the present size of our congregation that was new, functional, easier to maintain, with ADA access and modern bathrooms and kitchen. The inefficient, high maintenance and irregular heat of the steam system was to be replaced with a new more efficient system. The sanctuary platform was to correct years of changes in the sanctuary including removing pews, worship service changes and use of the organ. Hopefully we will be wise enough to make good decisions for the future of our church.
