Grace and peace to all,

Thanksgiving. That is the spiritual theme of the month of November. The harvest is in. The warm light of the sun has once again done its life-giving work with us and will now focus its nurturing rays on other nations and people. Blessed and loved people – that is who we are. Thanks be to God.

Yet, two days ago the smoldering hatred of anti-Semitism emerged as a gunman entering a synagogue and heedlessly murdering people because of their faith: people he did not know; victims' families who will never forget him.

The morning after the shooting at the Tree of Life synagogue in Squirrel Hill, we gathered for our 11:00 a.m. worship. A pall of sadness lay upon my spirit as the service began. I am sure I was not alone. Yet, thanks be to the Spirit of God who gives us a peace that passes all understanding, the worship service comforted and encouraged all participants – including me.

For me, the shooting amplified the dark and dangerous days we are living in. Americans are deeply divided and mistrustful of one another. We can't even talk with each other anymore. Even in church. Anxiety prevails. Yet we give this month we will give thanks.

A good friend of the church, a lovely woman named Nia, reached out to me the evening of the shooting. She said that she was praying for us. Then, Nia shared a biblical reflection with me from the Book of the Prophet Habakkuk, chapter 3, verses 17-19.

Though the fig tree does not blossom,
And no fruit is on the vines;
Though the produce of the olive fails
And the fields yield no food;
Though the flock is cut off from the fold
And there is no herd in the stalls,
Yet I will rejoice in the Lord;
I will exult in the God of my salvation.
God, the Lord, is my strength;
He makes my feet like the feet of the deer,
And makes me tread upon the heights.

Powerful words, aren't they? Even in dark times, we give thanks. Even when the nation is riven with anger, we give thanks. Even the dark mourning cloaks our city and nation with its sadness, we give thanks. Have a blessed Thanksgiving Day everyone.

Year 2 Pledges Due for Building Renovation Fund

Per Capita 2018

Per capita is more than a "head-tax." The Presbyterian way is connectional. Each congregation is a member of a presbytery, each presbytery is a member of a synod, and all synods combined for the General Assemble. Each one of these organizational layers supports one another and provides assistance in ministry and mission for one another. The per capita represents the administrative expense required to make this connectional system function. The per capita for 2019 is the same as 2018. STEWARDSHIP MEDITATION


Fall is the time when many organizations have fund drives for donations. The other week, I was listening to a fund drive by our local Public Radio station. The public radio personality was having a conversation with a businessman. "I want you to give me 10 cases of hot dogs and in return, I will pay for one case." The businessman was incredulous. "You are out of your mind! That is not how we run our business." The public radio personality added, "But that is how it is with public radio – about one in ten give. The other nine get a free ride." The businessman offered a suggestion, "You guys at public radio are too quiet. You have to talk louder! Shout!"

How about the practice of our Christian faith? There are some similarities. While we meet and greet many at Christmas, Easter, Baptisms, Weddings, Funerals, Church Concerts, Communal Meals, etc., only about 10% of the community attend worship and support the church regularly. Somehow, we have been able to sustain our operation with this model – although times are getting tough. A small number of us supports our faith. Perhaps the intriguing question is – why do those who give do so? In particular, why do some choose to tithe or give 10% of their income to the church? There is no simple answer to this question. However, in my experience, I found some answers by listening to others. One faithful member once told me, "We have a small family and our budget is tight. Each month, I not sure if we will be able to make ends meet. Yet, as I became more involved in church and faith, I realized that I am not alone. There are others who are less fortunate. Through faith, God helps us and supports us. All we need to do is to trust Him. First, I thought I could not tithe. Then I started to apportion a tenth first and live off the rest. Almost like magic, it worked; and I feel better. I feel closer to God."

I am impressed and admire those who have such faith. They give out of their love of God and others and their giving creates a conduit that is everlasting. They treasure this connection. As our Pastor says, God cares less about how much we make; The Lord cares more about how much we give. Stewardship is examining what we have and carefully redistributing our wealth. So, how shall we grow in Stewardship? Do we need to talk louder? Shout? I think differently. What we need to do is to listen. Listen to others. Listen to God and Jesus. Listen to the Spirit. The Lord does not disappoint. Stewardship is a Spiritual Matter and a Matter of our Life Priorities.

ARMISTICE DAY A Word from President Woodrow Wilson

ADDRESS TO FELLOW-COUNTRYMEN
The White House, November 11, 1919.

A year ago today our enemies laid down their arms in accordance with an armistice which rendered them impotent to renew hostilities, and gave to the world an assured opportunity to reconstruct its shattered order and to work out in peace a new and juster set of international relations. The soldiers and people of the European Allies had fought and endured for more than four years to uphold the barrier of civilization against the aggressions of armed force. We ourselves had been in the conflict something more than a year and a half.

With splendid forgetfulness of mere personal concerns, we remodeled our industries, concentrated our financial resources, increased our agricultural output, and assembled a great army, so that at the last our power was a decisive factor in the victory. We were able to bring the vast resources, material and moral, of a great and free people to the assistance of our associates in Europe who had suffered and sacrificed without limit in the cause for which we fought.

Out of this victory there arose new possibilities of political freedom and economic concert. The war showed us the strength of great nations acting together for high purposes, and the victory of arms foretells the enduring conquests which can be made in peace when nations act justly and in furtherance of the common interests of men.

To us in America the reflections of Armistice Day will be filled with solemn pride in the heroism of those who died in the country's service, and with gratitude for the victory, both because of the thing from which it has freed us and because of the opportunity it has given America to show her sympathy with peace and justice in the councils of nations.


In November 1918, the congregation of the First Presbyterian Church celebrated the completion of the construction of our sanctuary and installation of a pipe organ. "Built at a cost of \$143,000 with a \$16,000 pipe organ" the congregation dedicated the sanctuary for the glory of God.

On Sunday, November 11, we will rededicate this sanctuary to glory of the God who is the same yesterday, today, and forever. Our good friend, Ruth Pickering, will be with us to help us remember and celebrate the ministry and mission our congregation to the Edgewood and surrounding communities. A special service of re-dedication will raise our spirits and inspire on-going ministry and mission in the name and spirit of Jesus Christ.
