What are you doing today?

In 1941, the Empire of Japan led a surprise attack on Pearl Harbor, killing over 2,400 US American citizens. In turn, the US government detained over 125,000 people of Japanese descent living in the United States, including U.S. Citizens. At "War Relocation Authority Centers," the vast majority of people were innocent families held without charges, and over half of all detained were children.

Facing our own history can be quite difficult, but it's vital to our witness of the gospel. Our country is just starting to face this history and recognize the injustices that were committed by our government. Our siblings of Japanese descent lived under inhumane conditions for three years—having their property and possessions seized and not returned. How do we face this history as people who claim a God of love, compassion, and peace? Most Christian Americans turned a blind eye, yet in his memoir *They* Called Us Enemy, George Takei shares that some in the outside world offered support:

Some people saw injustice for what it was and sought to do something about it.

Each month, a Quaker missionary named Herbert Nicholson delivered books from Vroman's bookstore to the nearby camps... Although he had been granted permission by the camp director to come and go as he pleased, not everyone appreciated his work.

After he was attacked, the people of Manzanar assumed they'd seen the last of Herbert. But sure enough, the next month on that same date Herbert was back at Manzanar with more books. He went above and beyond for the internees—delivering books, donations, personal effects, and once even a loved one's cremated remains. He also took pets to veterinarians outside of camp. The man devoted his life to advocating for Japanese Americans during, as well as after, the war. (p. 145-147)

Born in Rochester, NY in 1892, Nicholson grew up in a Quaker family and dedicated his life to being a missionary in Japan. He knew that his job was more than telling people about Jesus. During his years in Japan, he helped rural farmers create a savings account program, launch a goat farm, build a home for the elderly, and care for people with leprosy.

So, during WWII, he and his wife Madeline offered aid to those in concentration camps. They helped convert the West LA Methodist Church's chapel into a warehouse for stored goods and frequently delivered these goods to those in the camps. Upon seeing their work, the camp director offered them any job they

wished at the camp. However, they declined because they opposed the concentration camps and wanted to remain outside so that they could fight them.

Often, we ask, "What would you have done if you lived during that time?" And we say, "I would have protested the injustices. I would have delivered food or called my politicians. I would have been on the side of love." Yet that's not the question we need to be asking. Rather, we need to ask: "What am I doing now? How is the Holy Spirit unsettling me to act today?" As we seek to be a community church, what injustices are happening in our neighborhood that are in direct opposition to the Gospel of Christ? My prayer is that we can find entry points to get involved. I fear the question from my grandchildren asking, "Where were you when all those things were happening?"

Let us not be idle but get involved in the work Christ is already doing in the world around us!

Tuesday Book Club



A Season of Giving

For the past several years, FPCE has partnered with Mars Home for Youth when collecting donations for the annual Manger Tree drive. MHY Family Services is a non-profit



organization serving youth with intensive behavioral needs and social challenges, and providing them a safe environment on their journey to wellness. Each year, MHY supports over 300 children through our residential program, and over 1,000 boys, girls and families in our community through our specialized trauma-based treatment. Our own Jim and Lisa Segedy are active with MHY as volunteers and members of the board of directors. A list of needed items and ways to donate can be found on the church website at fpcedgewood.org. Donations must be received by December 5 so the volunteers and staff can organize and distribute accordingly.



In our own backyard, FPCE also supports the efforts of Wilkinsburg Community Ministry in their food distribution programs. WCM provides services to approximately 5,000 residents per year, including senior citizens, citizens with disabilities, at-risk youth, and families who are economically challenged, unemployed, under-employed or facing emergency situations. WCM is a collaboration of seven area churches, with members of the board representing each of the churches. In 1968, a number of clergy and lay leaders from ten congregations

formed the Board of Directors for the Wilkinsburg Community Ministry. The unity of several congregations makes it possible for WCM to meet the extreme needs of poverty and hunger in our community and provide effective community services to all persons regardless of race, religion, gender, sexual orientation and creed.
