REPORT FROM STRATEGIC PLANNING TEAM

We have been reaching out and making contacts with neighboring Presbyterian Churches. One recent development is the communication with the Upper Room Church in Regent Square. They are a small church of young devoted folks (oldest is 40 years old) who hold their worship services in the Wilkins Community Building in Regent Square (http://www.pghupperroom.com/main/). They have some qualities we do not have and we have some that they do not have. We are in the very early phases of our affiliation. (Pastor Michael is having coffee and conversation with the pastor of Upper Room, Brendan Ashley, on Friday, October 4.) By finding ways to collaborate, perhaps something good will happen.

For those of you who may have missed it, here is the summary of our Congregational Discussion from August which provides the context of this brief report.

Congregational Discussion Regarding the Future of FPCE

What is our current status?

In the recent decades, the First Presbyterian Church of Edgewood has experienced a decline in membership, church attendance, and giving. Over the last 25 years, our membership has decreased from approximately 400 to the most recent count of 90. Weekly Sunday worship service is averaging in the 30's. Along with the decline in membership, the giving by the congregation has decreased. And yet, our beloved church building remains and along with it, the expenses for maintenance. In running our church, personnel and building maintenance are the most significant expenses and for 2019, we are running a deficit budget of close to \$20,000. While we may be able to sustain ourselves under the current operational model for a few years, the Strategic Planning Committee believes that the time is ripe to look for new ways to better serve our Lord.

What is missing from our church?

The greatest element missing from our church is the next generation of young adult members (i.e. people in their 20's, 30's, and 40's). Even if our finances had been in better order, without the next generation, the FPCE is at risk of further decline. How can we make faith and religion relevant to Generation X and the Millennials?

What do we need?

The traditional church formula is not working and we are in need of change. Perhaps what we need is a new Christian identity or niche that would make us stand out. If we are successful in advertising our worthwhile cause, people will come from miles away. In this regard, the concept of community reaches out to the greater Pittsburgh East End, not just Edgewood.

What is the solution?

There is no clear solution yet and our eventual decisions may not be to the liking of all. Nonetheless, the Strategic Planning Committee believes that it would be to our best interest not to be insular. We can benefit from building stronger relationships with nearby East End Presbyterian churches. To this effect, we have reached out to Waverly Presbyterian Church, Second UP Presbyterian Church, Forest Hills Presbyterian Church, and Swissvale Presbyterian Church. Of these churches, Waverly

The use of the kitchen by Dr. Amy Andrews and her group, to prep for Picklesburg, on July 24-25 from 9 A.M. – 5 P.M.



A LETTER FROM WILKINSBURG COMMUNITY MINISTRY

Dear Friends,

This year, as we give thanks for our blessings, please remember those who are not as fortunate. For 51 years, Wilkinsburg Community Ministry has served the hungry, the homeless, and the underserved.

You'll hear more about our activities this year in the upcoming Well, which should reach your mailboxes in a couple of weeks. In summary, though, I can share that we provided over 20,000 meals to children and youth through our childhood nutrition program. We also provided meals to the Wilkinsburg senior center meetings. During the year our food pantry served close to 1,200 families. Our congregational partners have collected back-to-school knapsacks for Wilkinsburg kids. This Thanksgiving we will distribute 100 meal kits to families in need; at Christmas, we will distribute another 100 meal kits, plus supplemental food for breakfasts and lunches, and hygiene kits for families.

Your donations play an important part in this mission. Pennsylvania supports a portion of our efforts to feed kids; this amounts to only 22% of our income; the rest is generated through congregational and individual gifts and donations from businesses, organizations and foundations. As a participant in this effort, you are an important part of this Wilkinsburg mission, and we thank you for your ongoing generosity.

I hope we can count on your generosity again this year.
