In-Person Worship Safety Protocols & Guidelines

Due to the rise in cases of COVID-19 and the Delta Variant, and in response to Allegheny County moving from the moderate to substantial, and now to the high transmission rate, the Worship Committee/Session has reinstated safety protocols for in-person



worship following CDC recommendations as follows:

- Properly worn masks are required for all those attending worship regardless of vaccination status. (Those leading worship may remove masks when speaking or singing unless masking becomes mandated by the Allegheny County Health Department or the Governor.)
- Please continue to observe social distancing in the marked pews.
- Congregational singing may continue while masked. You are welcome to use the hymnals in the pews, stand and join in singing of hymns and responses. Lyrics will continue to be printed in the bulletin for those following along online.

We understand that each person is different with the possible risks he or she may have. Live-streamed online worship will continue to be available on Facebook and YouTube for those who choose to stay home until they feel safe to rejoin in person.



Walking in the way of St. Francis, a visionary lover of all creation, Elder Jim Segedy will be Blessing the Animals who come his way. He will be on the side lawn (weather permitting) from Noon to 1:00 p.m on Saturday, October 2. All creatures great and small - and their guardians - are welcome.

The service will open with a brief liturgy and prayer, then each pet will be blessed individually. Coffee and snacks will be served. Please invite your friends, families, and neighbors to this blessing ceremony.

Pittsburgh East CROP Walk

On October 10, the Pittsburgh East community will celebrate its 44th year of walking to end hunger one step at a time. The oldest walk in the country, is sponsored by Church World Service (www.churchworldservice.org). 25% of what we raise is returned as grants to East End



Common Ministries and Wilkinsburg Community Ministry. FPCE will participate in this event with walkers Judy and Mariah Mysels and Rhonda Apessos, who aim to raise \$800. If anyone else would like to join our small group of walkers, let Rhonda or Judy know. We gather at the South Avenue United Methodist Church at 1:00 to prepare for the 10K loop through Squirrel Hill and back. The walk distance is 6.2 miles. You can participate by either walking or sponsoring FPCE walkers. We have 38 walkers registered so far. \$9,710 raised as of September 26.

Pastor Nominating Committee Update

The PNC has continued along the path set forth by Presbytery. The Ministry Information Form (MIF), which is basically the church profile that will be uploaded to the national search system, was submitted to Session and approved at their September meeting. It is currently in the hands of our Commission on Ministry liaison Ann Turnock and Pittsburgh Presbytery staff contact Brian Wallace. As soon as they give us the go-ahead, the MIF will

be entered into the Church Leadership Connection website for us to begin receiving matches to our profile based on what potential pastors enter on their Pastor Information Forms (PIF). The committee will then begin screening the matches as well as self-referrals that come in to determine who we might be interested in contacting for first round interviews.

Please continue to pray for the ministry of FPCE, for the intervention of the Holy Spirit into our discernment process, and for the members of the committee as they move forward in the search to find the person called to share in the next chapter of our life in Christ.



September has been a month of reunions and remembering the joy of praising God through music. It has been a real blessing to have our Sanctuary Choir back in worship again, raising their voices in harmony during our anthems. The worship ensemble was back in full force, complete with our long-lost drummer Johnny returning to the group. And seeing the congregation standing and participating in the hymns and responses (even with a mask on) has been uplifting.

As with most transitions and attempts to return to "normal," some adjustments have been required and sometimes things don't go as smoothly as possible. For instance, while it was great to have the drum set back in our emerging service, we used a V-Drum Kit (an electronic version of a drum set that gets plugged into a sound system) and discovered that the signal it sent out to the camera for online worship overloaded the other instruments and microphones, causing those watching on Facebook and YouTube to hear a bunch of distortion instead of the songs those in the sanctuary heard. I'm hoping it's a simple fix of just adjusting some levels for this month, but we may end up needing to get a new mixing board.

Also, while attempting to make it feel more like a pre-pandemic service, we've reintroduced the gathering song (even though it takes about 30 seconds to pass the peace with a wave since no one is walking around and hugging just yet), and have added a response in the spot that would have been the offertory and/or doxology (even though we aren't physically passing the collection plates). Hopefully, sooner rather than later we will no longer be distancing or wearing masks and then "regular" worship can resume. Til then, to quote a certain animated fish, we'll "just keep swimming!"

World Communion Sunday - A Presbyterian Gift

World Communion Sunday (originally called World Wide Communion Sunday) is a gift of the Presbyterian Church to the larger ecumenical church. The first celebration occurred at Shadyside Presbyterian Church in Pittsburgh, PA, in 1933 where Dr. Hugh Thompson Kerr served as pastor.

John A. Dalles, a PCUSA pastor who has researched the history of World Communion Sunday notes this in his blog entry, reprinted from the October 7, 2002, issue of *Presbyterian Outlook*:

Davitt S. Bell (the late Clerk of Session and church historian at Shadyside) recalled that Dr. Kerr first conceived the notion of World Communion Sunday during his year as moderator of the General Assembly (1930). Dr. Kerr's younger son, the Rev. Dr. Donald Craig Kerr, who is pastor emeritus of the Roland Park Presbyterian Church in Baltimore, was sixteen in 1933. He has related that World Communion Sunday grew out of the Division of Stewardship at Shadyside. It was their attempt to bring churches together in a service of Christian unity—in which everyone might receive both inspiration and information, and above all, to know how important the Church of Jesus Christ is, and how each congregation is interconnected one with another. When I asked Donald Kerr how the idea of World Communion Sunday spread from that first service to the world wide practice of today, this is what he replied,

"The concept spread very slowly at the start. People did not give it a whole lot of thought. It was during the Second World War that the spirit caught hold, because we were trying to hold the world together. World Wide Communion symbolized the effort to hold things together, in a spiritual sense. It emphasized that we are one in the Spirit and the Gospel of Jesus Christ."

Celebration of World Wide Communion Sunday was adopted as a denominational practice in the Presbyterian Church (US) in 1936. Churches in other denominations were invited to celebrate with us from the beginning, but it wasn't until 1940 when the Department of Evangelism of the Federal Council of Churches (a predecessor body of the National Council of Churches) promoted extending the celebration to a number of churches around the world that the practice became widespread. Today, World Communion Sunday is celebrated around the world, demonstrating that the church founded on Jesus Christ peacefully shares God-given goods in a world increasingly destabilized by globalization and global market economies based on greed.
