FPCE Begins New Chapter with Call of Next Pastor

At a congregational meeting held on September 11, 2022, the Pastor Nominating Committee presented its recommended candidate to be the next called Pastor for the First Presbyterian Church of Edgewood. After the vote, the call was extended to and accepted by Jason Dauer. He officially began in the office the next day and led worship officially on September 18. Pittsburgh Presbytery affirmed the call at their September meeting held at Camp Crestfield on September 22.



Jason's ordination and installation service took place on September 25, where friends, family, and colleagues in ministry shared in lifting him up and affirming his call to become a Minister of Word and Sacrament and a Teaching Elder in the Presbyterian Church (USA). Lorraine Douthett hand crafted a beautiful blue Advent stole and presented it to the newly ordained Reverend Dauer on behalf of the congregation, along with one of our Christmas ornaments in the shape of the FPCE building. Jason's mother organized a beautiful spread of treats along with some donations from a few of our members at a celebratory reception in the Gathering Place. We look forward to sharing in the next chapter of ministry to our community in Edgewood with our new pastor, the Reverend Jason Dauer!



October 2022 Worship Schedule

Join us Sunday mornings at 11:00AM in the Sanctuary for worship. October 2: World Communion Sunday. The first Sunday in October is designated as World Communion



Sunday, which celebrates our oneness in Christ with all our brothers and sisters around the world. We welcome back to our pulpit the Rev. Chris Taylor to lead the service along with Rev. Dauer. Music selections will represent various cultures and styles from around the world. And this Sunday marks the return to "regular" communion in worship as the congregation will be invited forward to partake of the elements for the first time since before Covid shut us down in March 2020.

October 9: CROP Walk Sunday. Pastor Jason preaches from Luke 17:11–19 where Jesus heals ten people with leprosy; only one returns to give thanks.

October 16: Emerging Worship. Our worship ensemble will return to provide music at our first emerging service since Pentecost at the beginning of June. Pastor Jason preaches from Luke 18:1–8 – The widow and the unjust judge: pray always and do not lose heart.

October 23: Pastor Jason preaches from Luke 18:9–14 where Jesus tells a parable: the prayers of a Pharisee and a tax collector.

October 30: Reformation Sunday. Luke 19:1–10 – Zacchaeus, a tax collector, wants to see Jesus; Jesus visits his home. Pastor Jason preaching.

Glimpse into who we are:

I love church history. I wouldn't call myself a "history buff," but I love learning about who we are because of where we have been. In grade school, I never found history exciting—learning dates and the names of battles didn't really affect how I lived my life. It wasn't until I started diving into my family's history that I cared. My grandma told me of the farm she grew up on—of the berry patch, cherry orchards, half dozen Guernsey milk cows, and two horses named Betty and Bob.

The stories placed me in a tradition. They explained why we had the pine trees around the house planted in neat rows—my greatgrandfather was a Christmas tree farmer. The stories and history helped me understand who I was and gave value to our traditions and practices.

When I started learning church history, I found a wealth of knowledge about spirituality, resistance, ecology, and hope. I didn't know that monks brewed beer and drank 5 liters per day. I had no clue that many women chose to become nuns so that they could have autonomy outside of a marriage.

Learning church history helped me locate who I am as a follower of Christ. It gave meaning to our symbols and practices. I fell deeply in love with the stories of Christians throughout time—our saints. We celebrate All Saints Day every year for this reason! It helps us remember who we are because of who came before us.

Now, All Saints isn't until November 1, but I want us to start thinking about who the saints are in our lives. The PCUSA website

While we may give thanks for the lives of particular luminaries of ages past, the emphasis is on the ongoing sanctification of the whole people of God. Rather than putting saints on pedestals as holy people set apart in glory, we give glory to God for the ordinary, holy lives of the believers in this and every age. [All Saints Day for Presbyterians] ... is an appropriate time to give thanks to members of the community of faith who have died in the past year.

Who are some of those ordinary saints who have fed us wisdom, stories, or maybe even food? I am excited to share stories of spirituality, resistance, ecology, and hope with you through our monthly newsletters. You may know some of them, and others will be new!

There is power in learning our history and remembering that people like us have been struggling with the same questions about God for hundreds of years! Let us be comforted and encouraged as we remember the stories of joy, justice, hope that have created us and allow us to be together today. It is our stories that make us!

Common Ministries and Wilkinsburg Community Ministry. FPCE will participate in this event with walkers Judy and Mariah Mysels and Rhonda Apessos, who aim to raise \$800. If anyone else would like to join our small group of walkers, let Rhonda or Judy know. We gather at the South Avenue United Methodist Church at 1:00 to prepare for the 10K loop through Squirrel Hill and back. The walk distance is 6.2 miles. Why support the Crop Walk?

Because you want to help families locally and abroad who are struggling with hunger.

- According to the Food and Agriculture Organization of the United Nations worldwide between 702 and 828 million people were affected by hunger in 2021. 46 million more than in the previous year. The World Food Program states that 345 million people in 82 countries are in danger of dying due to insufficient food. Extreme weather, wars, the pandemic, and high inflation are all creating havoc with people's access to adequate food. This is intolerable.
- A quarter of the money we raise will go to the local hunger work of Wilkinsburg Community Ministry (https://wcm15221.org) which serves over 5,000 residents each year. These residents include senior citizens, citizens with disabilities, at-risk youth and families who are economically challenged, underemployed or facing emergency situations.
- Seventy-five percent goes to the global humanitarian development work of Church World Services with over seventy-five years of experience alleviating hunger.

News from WCM

We will be starting our "We Share Food" Mobile Pantry on Saturday, September 24 with a distribution at Covenant Church and Eternal City, at the Corner of Park Avenue and Swissvale Avenue, in Wilkinsburg. This is a dry run and we expect many glitches! Distribution starts at 11 and ends at 1:30 (or if the food runs out before). This is a joint project with the Greater Pittsburgh Community Food Bank, supported by The Heinz Endowments and the PA Department of Agriculture. Eventually we will be operating the mobile pantry at 4-5 locations in Wilkinsburg and one in Swissvale.



In other news, we will start collecting for the Thanksgiving and Christmas distribution. Distribution will include a Thanksgiving gift card for Giant Eagle, provided by the Food Bank, vegetables (corn, green beans), stuffing mix, cranberry sauce, corn bread mix, and a dessert mix. We expect to be distributing for up to 200 families for each holiday. The Christmas distribution will not include a gift card. Please let us know if you'd like to order a specific collection or can help us with the purchase of these items!
