PASTOR'S PASTOR'S

Hello brothers, sisters and friends of FPCE,

God is trying to teach me something. God is discovering (as if He didn't already know) I am a very stubborn student.

God has been trying to get through to me for a long time. God's first effort to reach me with this truth began when my mother sang to me, a child, before I went to sleep.

Jesus loves me, this I know.
For the Bible tells me so.
Little ones to Him belong;
They are weak, but God is strong....
STOP!

That's the lesson.

When I am weak—and admit it—God is strong. I have a distant relative. A young man, in his mid-30's now. As Tony (not his real name) grew up, he never felt like he was "man enough." When he reached high school, he decided to do something about it. He tried out for football: made the team. as a running back—first string. He was in a couple of games and did very well. Then—during a running play, he was hit hard. Knocked out. Concussed. He had to guit football. So he moved to the wrestling team. Again, wrestled a few matches: did very well. Third or fourth match he had his arm pulled out of its socket. Had to quit. So he joined the Marines. Served two tours of duty in Iraq. He was honorably discharged. He's home now. Still striving. Still trying to be "man enough." He refuses to admit to any weakness.

But, ironically, that's where God get is! In our weakness, we discover that God is strong. Until we run smack-dab into our weaknesses; until we reach our limits; until we bottom out and come to the end of our self-made fuel supply; until that happens – we will never understand the truth of that childhood song we all know: "They are weak; God is strong."

Tony; striving, striving, striving to be a man. It is a story we know too well, isn't it? We strive. We strive to be good enough, strong enough, successful enough. We strive to be independent, self-reliant

people. That's the American dream!

But in our striving, we are running away from a God who is our strength. A God who finds our weakness to be an open door. When that door is finally open—God who is our refuge and strength—walks in.

A poem by Joyce Rupp expresses this truth very well:

When we live out of our weakness
You intervene with your grace
And draw us back to you.
When we fail to live as you desire,
You negotiate our turning 'round
And coming home to your love.
When we step aside from our principles,
You urge us to return to what is true.
You never give up on our inborn ability
To live the best of who we are.

There's an important lesson in those words. I am a stubborn student. No doubt. But the good news is—God is a patient and persistent teacher.

Fall FROGS begins Tuesday, September 8. Our after-school program operates Tuesdays and Thursdays, 3:45 -6:00pm in the lower level of the church building. Students are walked over from Edgewood Elementary School or may be brought to the church by family. The program includes snack, homework, reading, craft, outdoor play or games, and dinner. Participation is limited to twenty students in kindergarten through third grade. The cost is \$25/month, with some scholarship help available.

Volunteers find participation a rewarding experience and really make this program possible. You Are the New Day

While we all work to get ourselves into the routines of the "back to school" life, I often find inspiration in the songs chosen for any of the choirs I lead. The weeks before school starts are filled with stacks of music on the piano, me feverishly listening to recordings and YouTube

videos and playing through new songs. Thinking about the beginning of my 14th year of teaching at North Hills, the text to a beautiful song called "You Are the New Day" entered my mind.

I found the words could have many meanings, from the loss or beginning of a love or friendship, to hope for the future, to a metaphor for our relationship with God. A deeper search thanks to the wonders of Google brought me to what the actual composer was feeling at the time he wrote it, and it surprised me.

"You Are the New Day" was composed by multi-talented Welsh rock musician John David. However spiritually moving the listener might find the music, "You Are the New Day" is a secular song. David wrote it for Airwaves in 1978 during a time when personal difficulties and threats to world peace caused him to look for hope within himself. In John David's own words:

"The inspiration for New Day was quite simple; I had just had a major blow in my personal life, and was sitting alone late at night on the settee feeling very low, and watching an ominous story on the news about the very real possibility of nuclear war.

"I started singing to the (hopefully) soon-to arrive New Day like it was an entity, that would rescue me from the depths. If the sun came up and the birds started singing as usual then I could believe that it really was the new day in which life would go on, and in which hope would survive.

"The tune and the words popped into my head at the same time, and it was all written in about 10 minutes, which is why (to me at least) it's not perfect. But I didn't feel I had the right to change anything."

The British a cappella group The Kings' Singers recorded a gorgeous arrangement of this piece, and I performed it a few years ago with my North Hills Choir. The text to the song is on page 6 for you to ponder, but the sentiment "You Are the New Day" brings about excitement for the beginnings of our new year together. The new day and hope promised to us in the Gospel. Will you be a part of our "new day" in the music ministry?
